ARRL Launches All Out Grassroots Campaign To Get Amateur Radio Emergency Preparedness Act Passed

- Goal Is To Have Freedom To Operate From Wherever You Live
- All Hams, Whether ARRL Members Or Not, Can Participate



(WASHINGTON, DC) - For the past six years, ARRL officials and representatives have been steadily meeting with members of Congress to find a way for licensed Amateur Radio operators who live in neighborhoods with private land restrictions to erect outdoor antennas without penalties. Over time, federal laws have restored rights for satellite dishes, broadcast TV antennas and flag poles for homeowners in private subdivisions—now the time has come to permit federally licensed Amateur Radio operators to have the freedom to have the antennas they need to get on the air. The result of lengthy negotiations with congressional staffs is the *Amateur Radio Emergency Preparedness Act*. The climate is ripe to get support and co-sponsorship from elected Congressional members, but they won't endorse the bill unless you and your fellow licensed Hams ask them. 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any Appalachian mountain Hams won't soon forget the final weekend of September last year, and the many weeks of sorrow and hardship which followed, some of which remains. As tragic as the damage was, Amateur Radio shined in its instantaneous and sustainable response in supplying emergency communications. Most impressive were the multiple platforms of response, both formal and informal. They were:

AUXCOMM—North Carolina Emergency Management (NCEM) opened its Western Branch office employing an ESF-2 (Emergency Support Function—2 "Communications") response within FEMA's AUXCOMM (AUXiliary COMMunications) standards. Amateur Radio filled key gaps until remote StarLink nodes and commercial cell sites could be restored.

ARES® - Although western North Carolina took the brunt of damage from Hurricane Helene in the Roanoke Division (eastern Tennessee in ARRL's Delta Division was also hard hit, along with portions of Georgia in ARRL's Southeastern Division), ARES groups (Amateur Radio Emergency Services®) in Virginia and South Carolina addressed pockets of damage.

NTS®—Operators in ARRL's National Traffic System® joined in health & welfare checks as families and friends sought information on the status of loved ones.

Most impressive of all was the fluid interchange of Hams informally stepping up and working with one another, both through the formal channels above and informally among each other. Nothing exemplified the commitment of Amateur Radio during this crisis than N2GE, the Mt. Mitchell repeater. Located atop the tallest peak east of the Mississippi River, the Mt. Mitchell repeater did not lose power in the hurricane's aftermath. More importantly, its traffic was available to listen on Broadcastify.com. Hams far away with VHF beams complemented HF stations by moving traffic into and out of the impacted zone through the repeater.

From September 26 through October 2, Hams are encourages to share recollections and reflections on the Mt. Mitchell repeater, either directly or through the W4FTK-R EchoLink reflector 367365. For more details, look at callsign N2G at www.QRZ.com

CHANGES AND TRIBUTES TO ROANOKE DIVISION REPRESENTATIVES TO ARRL'S DX ADVISORY COMMITTEE (DXAC)

Whether you enjoy casually chasing DX, or you're an ardent pursuer of rare entities, ARRL has spent the last century working with it counterpart radio societies around the globe to make DXing accessible and fun for all Amateur Radio operators. Constantly shifting boundaries for both natural and political reasons, along with evolving technologies, means that rules for DXing need to change with the times. Representing ARRL members in each of the League's 15 divisions are members of ARRL's DX Advisory Committee (DXAC). The purpose of the DXAC is to analyze the state of DX and recommend changes, when warranted, to ARRL's Programs and Services Committee (PSC), the committee which in turn makes recommendations to the full board on DX as well as other aspects of Amateur Radio operating procedures. DXAC members are appointed by their respective directors. As you would expect, these representatives are accomplished DX operators in their own right, and thoroughly understand the intricate workings of DX and eligible entities.

Serving the Roanoke Division as DXAC representative for 36 years until 2024 was Gary Dixon, K4MQG, from Fort Mill, South Carolina. First licensed in 1957, Gary has kept his original callsign and with it reached 380 countries to earn #1 on the DX Honor Roll. He was inducted into the CQ DX Hall of Fame in 2013, and was a founding member of the International DX Association (INDEXA) and has served as its vice president, president and as a director. He also has earned 8 band Honor Roll, 10 Band DXCC, 8 Band WAZ and has achieved DXCC Honor Roll on every band 80-10 meters. You can find Gary actively on the air and as a faithful QSL card checker at many hamfests in North and South Carolinas.





When Gary indicated he wanted to step down as the Roanoke Division's DXAC representative, Director Jim Boehner appointed Lou Dietrich, N2TU, from Mooresville, North Carolina. Sadly, shortly after this appointment, Lou was diagnosed with a terminal disease. In his almost year as the Roanoke DXAC representative, he championed new DX awards which reflect the challenges many Hams face with restricted antenna access. Besides earning DXCC Honor Roll and 10 Band DXCC, Lou participated in many DXpeditions, among them CYoS Sable Island, NH8S Swains Island, K1N Navassa Island and K5P Palmyra. He also operated from U.N. headquarters and the Vatican. He said he chose the vanity callsign N2TU because he wanted to thank everyone (TU) in our wonderful hobby. Lou became a Silent Key (SK) August 15, 2025

After the untimely passing of Lou Dietrich, Director Jim Boehner, N2ZZ, asked renowned DXer Hal Turley, W8HC, from St. Albans, West Virginia if he would serve as the Roanoke Division DXAC representative, and Hal graciously accepted. Like his immediate two predecessors, Hal has earned DXCC Honor Roll and 10 Band DXCC. He has served as ARRL West Virginia Section Manager and is the past president of the West Virginia DX Association. Hal's passion is orchestrating and participating in DXpeditions, including N5J Jarvis Island, CBoZA Robinson Crusoe Island, E51D North Cook Island, KH8RRC Tutuila Island in American Samoa, VP6A Ducie Island, 9G4X Ghana, JWoA Sval-



bard, K7K and KL7RRC in the Aleutian Islands of Alaska and VP6R Pitcairn Island. Coming up this November he'll be traveling to the Republic of Burundi as part of the 9U1RU team. Hal brings a unique perspective from both a home based operator and as a DXpeditioner in understanding the challenges DXers face. We are fortunate in the Roanoke Division to have three consecutive accomplished DX experts representing our members. \Diamond

TRIDENT-NEW DX AWARD

Based on the popularity of the Triple Play Award, ARRL has created the DXCC Trident Award. Many active Hams will find to their delight they may already qualify for the new award. Like the Triple Play Award, where you must earn at least one confirmed QSO in each of the 50 states in three modes—phone, CW and digital—the Trident Award is the international equivalent. You need at least 100 confirmed contacts from via LoTW each in phone, CW and digital from different eligible DX entities to qualify—a total of 300 contacts. Like the Triple Play Award, the Trident Award is an LoTW only award. The countries do not have to be the same or match as long as they are 100 eligible countries per mode.
